Seems Jerry Bean stays in the Girl's Dorm promoting the 'cause.'

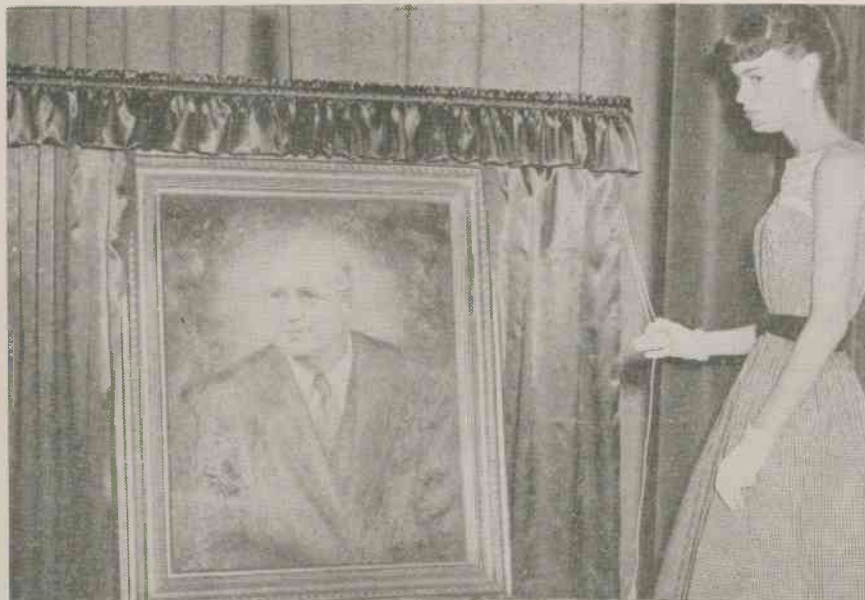
Pat Warren gets out his deer skin rugs at one o'clock a. m. and beats them on the walls. Some house cleaning.

## Portrait of Dr. Forest O. Mixon Presented to Chowan College By Sophomore Class of 1956-57

A portrait of the late Dr. F. O. Mixon was presented to the College by the sophomore class at commencement exercises. Louis Stokes, president of the Baptist Student Union, said in the presentation, "Chowan College will be forever in his debt."

He gave a short biography of Dr.

Mixon and noted that when he took the helm in 1951 the school had 86 regular students, as compared with 260 in 1957.

As a result of his efforts the college has doubled its plant value, has been fully accredited and has embarked on a ten-year building program.

The response to the presentation was made by Dr. Whitaker, and the portrait was unveiled by Miss Lynn Mixon, Dr. Mixon's daughter.

"Buildings, academic accreditation, a growing and thriving school and students made strong in 'doing the faith' these remain as monuments to F. O. Mixon," the speaker said.
