It was a day such as to be remembered in the years when memories bring back happy events. It was Saturday, October 3, 1959 . . . Homeoming Day for Chowan College.




A Special Homecoming

Yes, Saturday, October 3, 1959 . . . Homecoming Day will linger with the several hundred who enjoyed its moments.




