At 12:35 p.m. two chartered busses drove onto the campus, bearing some 85 students, bound for the annual international Student Retreat in Williamsburg, Virginia.

Awaiting the students' arrival were several members of the WMS of Meherrin Baptist Church and the WMS of Murfreesboro Baptist Church, who had prepared a meal of chicken, sandwiches, fruit, potato chips, and a soft drink for their anticipated guests. Tables were decorated with miniature dolls, representing the early New England Pilgrims, who celebrated that first Thanksgiving Day. Beside each plate was a "favor," made by members of the Sunbeam Bands from the churches and con-

taining a scriptural word of thanksgiving and a piece of chewing gum.

After a word of welcome and greeting by Chaplain Taylor and the invoking of God's blessing by the Reverend John Davis, the students settled down to eating and becoming better acquainted. Getting acquainted presented some problems, for not all the students had been in the United States long enough to communicate well in the English language.

In addition to the United States, the following nations were represented: Chili, Thailand, India, Netherlands West Indies, South Vietnam, Philippines, Hong Kong, Liberia, Taiwan, Korea, Uganda, Venezuela, Japan, Sierra Leone, Brazil, Egypt, Kenya, Syria, Trinidad, Greece, Pakistan, Cuba, Jordan, United Arab Republic, Iran, Ecuador, and Columbia.
