Williams Takes Full Advantage of Training

Keith R. Williams, lithographer third class, son of Mr. and Mrs. Baxter A. Williams, Ash, N. C. and a graduate of Chowan College, Murfreesboro, N. C., used his college training to full advantage aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Ticonderoga CVA-14.

Williams reported aboard Ticonderoga in February 1962 and asked to work in the printing field. He had completed a two year course in Graphic Arts at Chowan College after graduating from Waccamaw High School in Ash. He began work in Ticonderoga's print shop to "strike" for Lithographer. He put in his correspondence courses which enabled him to compete in the February 1963 Navy Fleet Wide Advancement in Rate Examination against all other Navy hopefuls and advanced to lithographer third class on July 16, 1963.

As assistant petty officer in

charge of the print shop, he helped instruct and supervise the work of four men "striking" for a Lithographer rating. Ticonderoga's print shop supplies the ship with most of her printing requirements. It has two photo offset and one letterpress presses. During a normal month, these presses print a monthly magazine, information material, maps and charts, instructions, notices and directives.

Representatives Of Chowan Attend Meeting

The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the regional accrediting agency, met for its 68th annual meeting in December and two Chowan College staff members were in attendance.

The meeting was held in spacious Peabody Hotel in Memphis, Tennessee. W. C. Morrisette, Dean at Chowan and V. L. McBride, Assistant to the President in charge of Public Relations, were among the 1100 or more persons who registered. Morrisette served as the voting delegate.

The association held four general sessions plus numerous commissions and committee meetings. Affiliated groups met seventeen times during the week giving the southern educators a full schedule. Conference themes were numerous: accreditation, the work of college deans, registrars and admissions officers, federal aid and participation, and the place of the church-related college in a world of expanding dialogue, were among them.

Chowan College is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Library Receives Copies of "The Master Is Here"

Dr. Bruce E. Whitaker, President of Chowan College, was the guest speaker at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Wake Forest recently.

Dr. Whitaker spoke at a Tuesday morning chapel service. Dr. E. A. McDowell of Southeastern Seminary is chairman of the chapel committee.

Following the morning chapel service in Wake Forest, Dr. Whitaker visited the grave of Dr. Archibald McDowell, the first president of Chowan College, 1848-1849 and 1862-1881, which was then called the Chowan Baptist Female Institute. Dr. E. A. McDowell is Dr. Archibald McDowell's grand-nephew.
