

Scholarship Test Dates Announced

The Competitive Honor Scholarship Committee at Chowan College has announced that a number of students have made the necessary preparations for competition in the annual Competitive Honor Scholarship Program examinations at Chowan College. The tests will be held on April 3 and 10.

The original date of the tests was set for April 10, but the additional date was added for the benefit of a number of students who will be attending the annual Beta Club Convention. A number of the students were involved in that convention. Now students may select from either of the two dates for tests which are on Saturday mornings.

The Competitive Honor Scholarship Committee, with the help of the admissions office, and patricularly Director of Admissions Ross A. Cadle, will play host to the students while they are on the campus. The tests will be administered in the morning and students will enjoy lunch in the college cafeteria and be given a tour of the campus.

Three Basic Groups

The Competitive Honor Scholarship Program includes three basic groups of scholarships, twenty-three in all. These scholarships range in value from \$1,000.00 each to \$300.00 each. Students are eligible for these competitive examinations by having made application to the college and being accepted as well as completing the scholarship application form and presenting same to the Competitive Honor Scholarship Committee. These scholarship forms may be acquired by writing the Competitive Honor Scholarship Committee, Murfreesboro, N. C.

Chowan renders additional scholarship aid to ministerial students, children of ministers, students from the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, and students interested in religious education.

W. C. Morrisette, Dean of the College, has announced that additional students interested in taking these exams must make immediate arrangements in order to be eligible for the examinations. With a date less than one month away every effort must be put forth by the student in order to become eligible. No limit has been set on the number of students who will compete for the exams.
