PROCEEDINGS OF TOWN COMMISSIONERS LAST NIGHT.—The report of the Street Commissioner was submitted by Commissioner Peay, chairman, as follows, for the months of May and June:

The Street Commissioner has opened up a new street, known as Roney street, running from Watkins street to Corbett street. The street gutters on Pine street have been lowered and a portion of the street raised. Main street has been cleaned between Church street and Mangum street, by taking up a part of the pavement and replacing it with street gutters at the intersection of Main and Mangum streets have been put on a level with Main street, which we think adds very much to the convenience and appearance of the street. Several bridges have been repaired and a number of street gutters cleaned out.

The report of the Chief of Police for the month of June shows that 29 warrants were issued during the month, as follows:

Assault and battery, 8; disturbing the peace, 3; loud and boisterous cursing, 3; drunkenness, 11; larceny, 1; dray trotting, 1; resisting an officer in discharge of duty, 1; allowing lot to remain in bad condition, after being notified, 1.

Fines and costs collected for month, \$114.15.

The report on the cemetery for the month of June shows the total number of burials two, one adult and one infant.

On motion, the Water Committee was instructed to investigate the muddy condition of the city water, inasmuch as numerous complaints had been made, and have the Durham Water Company to remedy the matter, and that the Water Committee submit their report on this matter at the next meeting of the Board.

Section 15, Chapter 2, of the Town Ordinance was amended to read as follows:

No person shall drive any dray, cart or wagon in any public street faster than at the rate of four (4) miles an hour, nor shall the driver of any vehicle, in any street, wantonly crack his whip, to the annoyance of others, nor suffer his vehicle to stand or pass, in any street, without holding the reins, except in the case of a wagon, cart or dray, while delivering or receiving a load. When vehicles meet, each shall go to the right, and if any vehicle passes another, it shall pass on the right. Any person offending against any provision of this section shall, upon conviction, be fined one dollar for each offense.

Section 8, Chapter 9, of the Town Ordinance was amended to read as follows:

Any person who shall oppose or resist, or in any manner abuse or insult any officer of the Town, or member of the police, while in the discharge of any duty, shall, upon conviction, be fined twenty-five dollars.

DISTRICT COURT.—A dispatch has been received from the Wilmington, N. C., which is to this effect:

Collector E. W. White, of the internal revenue district, returned from Washington, D. C., the commissioner of internal revenue recommended to the Senate the consolidation of the new district of North Carolina, the suggestion is made on account of the defeat of Eaves, whom the President appointed collector of the district, by reason of the Senate's refusal to confirm him. Dr. Mott, who was Eaves' bitter opponent, told the President recently that he had made Eaves' what he was. The President replied in a very sharp tone that he was aware of the existence of only one Creator. There is a great crowd of Republicans after the vacant collectorship. Among them are J. J. Mott, W. B. Henderson, George S. Smith, Robert Patterson and P. C. Thomas.

NARROW ESCAPE.—Late yesterday afternoon, in the Western part of town, there was an accident to Capt. J. S. Lockhart's carriage, that came near being a serious affair. Mrs. Lockhart, Misses Lillis Lockhart, Maggie Parrish and little Clarence Lunsford were out driving. In turning to go out one of the cross streets the king pin dropped, which uncocked the carriage and a portion of it striking the wheels, made a noise. The horses became frightened; jumped a four foot ditch and the carriage in. The occupants were thrown about and the carriage probably broken up. Mrs. Lockhart sustained several bruises and the skin cut in
