No person shall drive any dray, eart or wagon in, any public street faster than at the rate of four (4) miles an hour, nor shall the driver of any vehicle, in any street, wantonly crack his whip, to the annoyance of others, nor suffer his vehicle to stand or pass, in any street, without holding the reins, except in the case of a wagon, cart or dray, while delivering or receiving a load. When vehicles meet, each shall go to the right, and if any vehicle passes another, it shall pass on the right. Any person offending against any provision of this section shall, upon conviction, be fined one dollar for each of-

Section 8, Chapter 9, of the Town Ordinance was amended to read as fol-

Any person who shall oppose or resist, or in any manner abuse or insult any officer of the Town, or member of the police, while in the discharge of any duty, shall, upon conviction, be fined twenty-five dollars.
