### MOTHER AND SON DROWNED.

Mrs. Glenn and her 3 Year Old Boy  
Lose Their Lives While Looking  
after Fish Nets.

News reached here this morning of a sad affair which occurred yesterday afternoon on Col. Benahan Cameron's plantation, Fairtooth, about eight miles from Durham. A mother and son were drowned in the Red mill pond while attending to some fish nets.

A Mrs. Corina Glenn, wife of John Glenn, one of the tenants, and her little nine-year-old son left their home a little before five o'clock and went to the pond, to see if there were any fish in some nets which they had in the pond. Our informant did not know what caused them to fall in the pond, but thought the mother must have been holding to some bushes when they gave way or she lost her hold, or it might have been the little boy and the mother attempted to save him. Large bunches of her hair were found on the bushes and there appeared to have been a struggle.

Men began dragging the pond as soon as they found that Mrs. Glenn and her son had fallen in. All right along the search was kept up and this morning about four o'clock the body of Mrs. Glenn was found. The little boy had not been found when the party, who gave us our information, left this morning, but they were still searching for it.

This sad accident has cast quite a gloom over all the residents, both white and black, at Fairtooth, and they feel the deepest sympathy for Mr. Glenn in great sorrow.

News of the drowning was sent to Mr. Cameron at Raleigh, and he was expected to arrive in the city this morning on the O. & C. train. A man from his plantation was waiting at the depot to take him out, but he did not come.

### A Martyr to Duty.

From the Charlotte News we learn that James Moran, the policeman of that city, who was shot by a negro, who had stole two sacks of flour and whose arrest he was trying to make, died yesterday at half past twelve o'clock. He was considered one of the best and most popular members on the force.

The News also says that a telegram was sent to the chief of police of Charlotte, N. C., saying that he had been arrested there who acknowledges that he shot policeman Moran. Charlotte's chief of police went after him last night.

### The Birds Sing It.

According to Constable Jim Davis the birds have heard of the Keesley Institute.

He says that yesterday, coming to town from dinner, near the new cemetery, there sat a little bird singing, and his song was so plain that he stopped and listened for awhile.

### Death of an Editor.

A special to the Raleigh News-Observer announces that O. B. Oliver, one of the proprietors of the Review, died in Reidsville yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock of pulmonary consumption. He had been a victim to this slow and lingering disease for several months. The deceased was aged twenty six years and was held in high esteem in the community. He was a member of the Knights of Honor and the Reidsville Rifles, and was buried today with appropriate ceremonies.

### Rev. Joseph Wheeler III.

News was received here today that Rev. Joseph Wheeler, of the N. C. Conference of the M. E. Church, South, is lying critically ill, (if not dead) at his home in Charleston, S. C. Mr. Wheeler is well known in this section, having preached on several occasions here. He is eighty odd years of age, and a friend has this to say of him:

"Few men in the ministry have been in active service so long as 'father Wheeler,' as he was familiarly called, and none ever had a brighter realization of a happy entrance upon the blissful hereafter. His long life was spent in the work of his Master, and he looked to Him for his reward. Should this be his last illness he will be found ready for the summons."—Winston Sentinel.

### Raising Improved Stock.

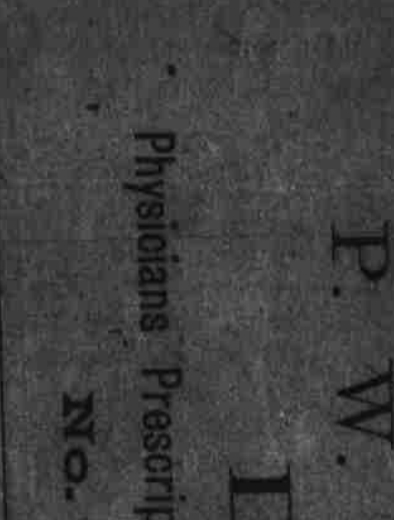
