CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 18.—All the bridges on the country roads in this section have been washed away and the angry waters have destroyed the railroad bridges.

Cleveland is cut off from all communication except with the west, and no trains are running over the Lake Shore road. East Erie, Pa., is badly washed out. The Valley Railroad is submerged and a World's Fair train is standing in two feet of water. The waves in Lake Erie are running higher than for many years and the storm is the worst ever known here at this season of the year.

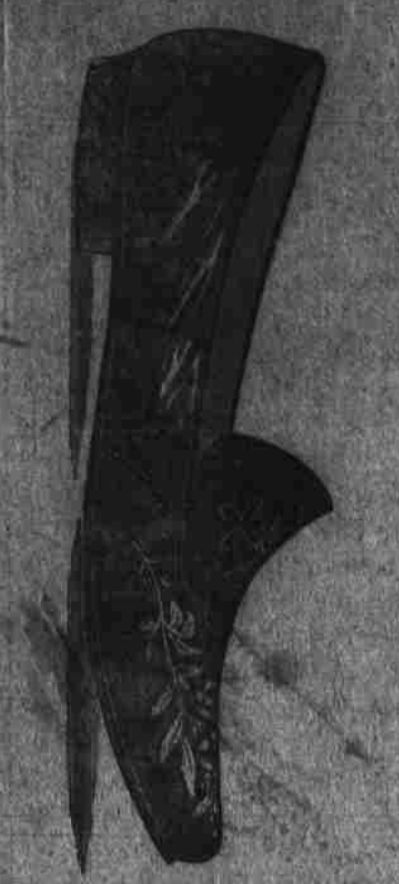
