DISTINGUISHED VISITORS.

JUDGE HATCH AND PARTY AT HOTEL CARROLINA.

"Trial of Christ Before Pilate" Tonight—Elks Banquet Monday Night.

Hon. E. W. Hatch, justice of the Supreme Court of New York; Messrs. John H. Whalen and J. P. Caddagan, of New York City, arrived in Durham this morning and are stopping at Hotel Carolina. These gentlemen will spend a few days in North Carolina on a bird hunt. Durham is glad to have these distinguished gentlemen in her midst.

Tonight at the Opera House, Judge Hatch will deliver his famous lecture, "Trial of Christ Before Pilate." He appears under the auspices of the Durham Lodge of Elks. Our people should esteem themselves exceedingly fortunate in having the opportunity of hearing Judge Hatch, for Durham is one of the few places in the South that will have that honor.

It is expected that the house will be crowded to its full seating capacity tonight. A great many seats have been sold, and if our citizens who have not already procured tickets desire to do so, they should get at once to Matthews' drug store and get them. Colored people will be admitted to the gallery for 50 cents.

On Monday night an elaborate banquet will be given by the Elks, at Hotel Carolina, in honor of Judge Hatch. The occasion will leave nothing to be desired.

DOINGS OF THE DAUGHTERS.

A Generous Donation and a Room Named For a Veteran.

The various chapters of the Daughters of the Confederacy, in North Carolina, have undertaken the noble work of furnishing the new dormitories, at the Soldiers Home, and each dormitory thus furnished is given a name by the Chapter, in memory of some Confederate soldier.

The White Furniture Company, of Mebane, N. C., has generously donated to the Julian S. Carr Chapter, of Durham, a whole set of furniture, thereby enabling this Chapter to make the furnishing more complete. In consequence an entire room has been set apart, and the name given to it is the W. P. Mangum room. He was one among the first commissioned officers killed, and was from Durham (then a part of Orange county) Lieutenant Mangum was a son of Hon. Wily P. Mangum.

The Julian S. Carr Chapter contemplate bestowing upon each of the Confederate Veterans, of Durham county, the Cross of Honor. These tokens are highly prized by Confederate soldiers, and are bestowed upon the veterans, or his oldest lineal descendant. This Chapter wished to give the Cross of Honor on the 19th of January, (as there are only certain days set apart for this occasion, and this being one of the days,) but they have been somewhat delayed in getting a list of the names from the R. F. Webb Camp, therefore they hope to award the Cross of Honor on May 10th, next.

Blank applications will be sent to each member of the R. F. Webb Camp and the Chapter hopes these blanks will be filled out and sent in promptly.

BAD CONDUCT AT HICKSTOWN

TWO CASES COME UP FROM THERE FOR TRIAL.

Mrs. Crabtree, a White Woman, Bound Over Under a \$400 Justified Bond.

For sometime past there has been complaint of a good deal of disorderly conduct in the locality about Hickstown. The officers of the law have been keeping an eye on that vicinity, with the result that two cases were tried at the court house this morning. Both of these cases are attributable to houses of ill fame.

The first case was tried before "Squire D. C. Gunter. Major Hamlin, the defendant, pleaded guilty to an assault upon George Rhodes. It seems that on the 26th of December, Hamlin went to the house of some Burton women, who bear a somewhat unsavory reputation. While there he was accused of having previously broken the door of the house to pieces. There were some words, when Hamlin, who had followed Rhodes out of the house, slammed the latter against the ground and hit him two or three licks.

After hearing the evidence, "Squire Gunter decided that the defendant must pay a fine of \$2 and costs.

Immediately after the disposition of the above case, Mrs. Tracy Crabtree was before "Squire G. A. Barbee on the charge of keeping a disorderly house at Hickstown.

The first witness who testified was George Richmond, colored, who said that the Crabtree woman's place was bad. People are going there in large numbers. The carryings-on disturb the people of that locality. He had seen men and women together.

Emma Richmond, colored, testified: The place is a bad one; men are there nearly all the time. Have seen them frequently.

Mrs. Caroline Hicks: The conduct there disturbs the people of that locality.

Flem Hicks: Quite a crowd of men stay there. Girls come out and drag them in. Have heard shooting there, the last time about Christmas.

Will Dezer testified that a good many boys went there at times. He had never seen anything wrong.

Constable Ed. T. Lea testified that while in the discharge of his official duties he went to the house mentioned on the 26th of December, and saw there some twenty or twenty-five drunken men. When he approached the men scattered, some going in every direction. He saw four drunken men lying in one bed together.

The defendant was bound over to court under a justified bond of \$400, which she has been unable to give at this writing. In announcing his judgment, the court said that such houses as the defendant has been running do more harm than most anything else in the world. In this "Squire Barbee is exactly right.

Returns to Wisconsin.
