

NEGRO OUTLAWED.

Reward of \$150 for the Arrest of Van Fuller.

HILLSBORO, N. C., Jan. 9.—(Special to the SUN.)—A proclamation of outlawry has been issued against Van Fuller, colored, by Justices John Kirkland and Joseph A. Harris, for the burning of the barn and stables of S. Paisley Kirkpatrick, on the night of November 17th, last.

Winnie Leak, colored, mother of Van Fuller, was sent to jail on the 31st of December, on a warrant charging her with setting fire to the barn and stable of James Adams, on the night of Dec. 29. She implicated her son in the burning of Kirkpatrick's and Adams' barns.

A reward of \$150 is offered for the apprehension and delivery of Fuller to the sheriff of Orange county, at Hillsboro. The negro is about 40 years old; 5 feet 11 inches high; weight about 175 pounds; dark ginger cake color, thick lips, thin mustache, upper front teeth lacerated on fore-finger caused by pistol shot, limps when walking.

Animals That Bloom.

Anemones, sponges, the sea cucumbers and certain other growths which bloom and apparently behave in all respects like plants are really animals.

The petals of the anemone, resembling those of a chrysanthemum, are really tentacles to catch food and put it into the hollow tube which forms the stomach, where it is digested. The sea cucumber has a flattened body. It occasionally moves at a snail's pace over the mud or sand, digging its petals, or arms, into the sludge for food to obtain which it swallows a fair proportion of mud. It has power to sting and so keeps away its enemies.

The sea lily so exactly resembles the common lily that it is difficult to realize that it is an animal and belongs to the starfish family. It has a stalk two feet long, with a disk for a body. The tentacles close round the disk, which has a mouth, and completes the deceptive likeness. They are the oldest form of animal life on earth, and their fossils are called "stone lilies."

These creatures were believed to be plants and many people still refuse to believe otherwise.

Big Company Formed.

LONDON, Jan. 7.—The Daily Mail prints an article in guarded terms suggesting that the Imperial Tobacco Company with a capital of £15,000,000, will presently issue shares to the public. The value of the company's incorporated business being £10,000,000, it will have £5,000,000 for fighting purposes, which is considered ample.

The paper also says that Mr. Duke, of the American Tobacco Company, the competition of which the Imperial Company was formed to meet, is renewing his negotiations with the French Government for the entire business of the French tobacco regime.
