TRACTION COMPANY ON CHAPEL HILL STREET.

Committee Appointed to Confer With One From Masonic Order in Regard to the Temple.

The Board of City Aldermen met on Monday night and transacted the following business:

The Water Committee recommended that a hydrant be located at a point about eight hundred feet beyond the location of the nearest hydrant in Hayti. The committee further recommended that a hydrant be located at the intersection of Trinity Avenue with Roxboro street, in front of the residence of J. S. Murray.

On motion, it was ordered that the report of the Water Committee be received and adopted.

The Street Committee reported that the Durham Traction Company is now engaged at work on Chapel Hill street and putting down their track according to the established grade of said street.

A communication from the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Masons of North Carolina was read, stating that at the last Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of A. F. and A. M., a committee was appointed to build a Masonic temple in which to hold its annual communications and from which all its business will be transacted. The communication states that the building will be erected at Raleigh, Durham, Greensboro or Charlotte.

On motion, it was ordered that a committee be appointed from the Board of Aldermen, consisting of Messrs. O'Brien, Mason and Taylor, to confer with a committee from the Masonic order and solicit subscriptions for the above purpose.

UNIVERSITY WON IN SIX.

Last Was the Debate With Johns Hopkins—Other News of Interest.

CHAPEL HILL, March 18.—(Correspondence of the SUN.)—Messrs. D. P. Stern and R. R. Williams are spending a few days with relatives and friends in Scotland Neck, on their return from Baltimore, where they represented the University in the debate with Johns Hopkins Thursday evening of last week. The contest mentioned makes the eighth intercollegiate debate that the University has taken part in during the last six years. Five of these were with the University of Georgia, two with Vanderbilt and one with Johns Hopkins. The University won in three of the debates with Georgia, in both the debates with Vanderbilt, and also in the debates with Johns Hopkins, making in all six victories out of the eight contests. Messrs. Stern and Williams are members of the Senior Class in the University.

Four of Prof. Collier Cobb's students in Geology stood the civil service examination and received appointments on the United States Geological Survey last week. Appointments like these bring salaries ranging from forty to one hundred dollars a month. During the last two years about a dozen students in the Department of Geology here have secured positions on the Survey.

Arrangements have been made to have Mr. Hamilton W. Mabie, of New York, lecture at the University sometime within the next three weeks.

Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Mott, of New York, left for Cambridge, Massachusetts, Friday evening, where Mr. Mott goes to resume his studies in Harvard University. They spent three weeks here hunting in the country around Chapel Hill. Mr. Mott is the son of one of New York's wealthy iron manufacturers. He expressed himself as highly pleased with Chapel Hill, and made arrangements to spend a part of the next hunting season here.
