## UNIVERSITY VS. LAFAYETTE.

Dr. Royster's Lecture on "Muscle" Attended by a Large Crowd.

CHAPEL HILL, March 22.—(Correspondence of the SUN)—The next game of baseball to be played here is the game between the University and Lafayette, which will be played Monday afternoon. Holt, who is captain and first baseman on the University nine, was not able to take part in the practice game yesterday, but is hoped to be in good condition by Monday. The playing in the game with Oak Ridge Thursday showed that the University team is made up of good material. Monday's game will doubtless be a good one. There will also be a game with Lafayette on Tuesday.

After Dr. Royster's lecture in the chapel Thursday night, there was a mass meeting of students and faculty complimentary to the University's representatives in the Johns Hopkins debate, Messrs. Stern and Williams. Dr. Baskerville presided. Speeches were made by the debaters, and several others. The chapel was crowded to its greatest capacity, and everything went to show the most hearty appreciation of the victory won in this debate with Hopkins.

Dr. Hubert A. Royster, dean of the University College of Medicine, which was recently established in Raleigh, spent the day here Thursday. He lectured to the students in medicine several times during the morning, and his lecture on "Muscle" that evening was heard by a large crowd, all of whom seemed delighted with it. The lecture consisted in the treatment of a technical subject in such a way as to make it interesting to even the most unscientific. L.

## AWARDED VERDICT OF \$225

## APPEAL TO BE TAKEN TO THE SUPREME COURT.

The Jury Decided This Morning That the Plaintiff Was Entitled to Damages

The suit of Mrs. B. Davis against C. Summerfield, which had been on in the Superior Court for several days this week, was given to the jury this morning between 10 and 11 o'clock.

After the jury had been out something over an hour and a half, they brought in a verdict for \$225 in favor of the plaintiff.

Attorneys for the defendant gave notice of an appeal to the Supreme court. They will fight the case to the bitter end.

The circumstances of why the suit was brought was told of in these columns three or four days ago. The attorneys who represent the parties interested in the suit closely contested almost every phase of the trial.

Court was adjourned for this week's term.
