**SHOT WHILE AT WORK.**

A Rifle Ball Glances From John Geer's Check Bone.

John Geer, colored, an employee of the Durham Traction Company, while at work on Chapel Hill street this morning, was struck on the cheek bone by a ball supposed to have come from a Flobert rifle. The ball rebounded, but notwithstanding this fact, caused a right painful wound.

There was no report at the time the shot was fired and the first the wounded man knew of it was when he was struck. It is supposed to have been a stray shot, but there is not the slightest clue as to who fired it.

**MR. HACKNEY WARNED.**

Advised to Make All Necessary Preparations in Time.

E. C. Hackney, manager of the Durham Opera House has received the following rather startling letter from Charlotte:

"I notice by the Charlotte papers that preparations are being made to ship the Elks Circus and menagerie from Charlotte to Durham.

"I had hoped for your sake that no effort would be made to exhibit the menagerie in your town, for the circus alone would be sufficient attraction to fill your house for two nights. However, as it is to be, I deem it my duty to you as a friend to warn you in advance so you may take time by the forelock and prepare for the ordeal through which you are destined to pass. There are a number of animals in the menagerie, the like of which has never been seen in any other show. They are so rare that when the authorities permit them to appear in the street parade, horses and even women and children become frightened at the unaccustomed sight, and veritable panics are the results. I would suggest that you call the attention of the chief of police to this fact, that he may either have part of the street parade suppressed or have extra officers along the line of march to guard against danger.

"But what I most particularly desire to say to you is that the papier mache mastodon, which is, so far as I know, the only one in existence, it being the last of its mighty race, is so large and so heavy that no ordinary stage is strong enough to sustain its heavy weight. If your contract with the circus company is the same as mine was, you cannot prevent it from going on the stage, and if it does, it will almost certainly break through it. My advice would be to have some strong truss work built under the stage. If labor and timber are as cheap in Durham as in Charlotte this can be done for about two hundred dollars.

**MR. D. L. BELVIN IS DEAD**

**PASSED AWAY SUNDAY AT HIS HOME.**

The Interment Took Place This Afternoon--Deceased One of the Best Known Citizens.

Mr. D. L. Belvin, one of the best known and most prominent citizens of Durham county, passed away Sunday morning at his home near Bragtown, after an illness of some time from cancer.

Deceased was about 64 years of age, and leaves six sons and two daughters. The sons are Ed., Orin, Lee, Eugene, Dock and Frank, and the daughters, Misses Emmie and Prudence.

Mr. Belvin was one of the county's best citizens in farming and development. He was interested in many manufacturing enterprises and had accumulated a considerable estate by his industry. He was liberal, even to a fault—generous hearted, and was highly esteemed by all who knew him. His death is deeply deplored throughout the county.

The funeral services were held this afternoon at Luke's chapel.

**MR. BYRUM'S FUNERAL.**

A Large Crowd Present at the Last Sad Rites.

The funeral services of Mr. H. W. Byrum, who passed away Saturday morning at the Watts Hospital, took place Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the residence of C. E. Jourdan, on McMannen street. The services were conducted by Revs. W. C. Norman and C. J. D. Parker. Interment was in the city cemetery. The floral-bearers were J. D. Pridgen, L. S. Christian, G. C. Farthing, C. C. Thomas.

The pall-bearers were as follows: W. J. Barden, J. B. Highsmith, Ernest Carrington, W. L. Christian, John Markham, Fred Latta.

A large number of friends and acquaintances of the deceased were present at the funeral and also at the burial at the cemetery. The floral offerings were quite numerous, and attested the appreciation in which the deceased was held.
