## THE ELKS' UNIQUE PARADE.

**IT WAS MOST CREDITABLE AND AMUSING.**

The Features Were Interesting and Strictly to Date—Circus Will be Tonight.

For some time before noon today the streets of the city were lined with immense crowds of people who were out to witness the big Elks' parade. On Main street especially the crowd densely lined the sidewalks. It reminded of circus days when John Robinson or Forepaugh & Selis Brothers' circuses were here. The parade was one of the most unique things we have ever seen. There were all kinds of curious people representing different parts of the globe.

Among the amusing things was an old carriage driven by a "rube" seemingly from the rural districts, and seated in the vehicle was his wife and son.

There were numbers of bicyclists in various costumes; two chariot drivers, "Ben Her" and "Ben Him;" Indians riding horses, some with saddles and some bareback; the leading lion tamer of the world; the tallest giraffe in captivity, accompanied by his keeper, and various other things to tedious to mention.

"Annie Oakley," the champion shot of this or any other country, showed her dexterity by breaking glass balls without a single miss all the way on the parade from the start to the finish.

"Fiji Jim" and the "Tame Filipino" were dandies, and did not fail to attract the attention of the crowds.

"Alla Rhook," accompanied by her attendants, was a lady that occupied a prominent place in the parade, and showed off to advantage.

The steam calliope brought up the rear of the parade, and of course you enjoyed the music.

A slow but sure feature of the parade was "Uncle Sam" driving a billy goat.

The W. A. Slater Co., had one of the widest hats in the parade ever seen in the city.

Near the head of the procession rode the mayor and W. A. Slater, while at the head were the buglers.

There were all kinds of automobiles, carriages, and all kinds of vehicles. There was plenty of red lemonade for the whole of Durham. A number of special "policeman" did duty on the streets, and created much merriment.

## MEETING MOST HARMONIOUS

**MR. FOUSHEE'S REMARKS TO A SUN REPORTER.**

People in Durham County Slow About Paying Poll Tax—Mr. Biggs Hero of the Occasion.

Mr. H. A. Foushee returned this morning from Raleigh, where he had been attending the meeting of the State Democratic Executive Committee as proxy for Mr. J. S. Manning. To a reporter Mr. Foushee said:

"I have attended a number of meetings of the State Executive Committee, and this was by all odds the best attended I ever saw. There were representatives present from all sections of the State who were very enthusiastic over the success of the party in the coming election. There seems to be no doubt that the Democrats will sweep the State at the next election by an overwhelming majority. The chances are that they will carry every Congressional district and that there will be fewer Republicans in the next General Assembly than in the last.

"From what I could learn, the white people are paying their poll tax more promptly everywhere else in the State than in the tobacco districts. For some reason, the people in this county are slow about paying their poll tax. They do not seem to realize that no man can vote at the next election unless he has paid his poll tax on or before the first day of May.

"The contest over the place for the convention was entirely good natured and one of the prettiest I have ever witnessed. The Greensboro delegation, headed by Ex. Gov. Steadman, were in full force and their fight was admirably managed. The Raleigh crowd were not as well organized as Greensboro's. After the second ballot the vote was still a tie, but fortunately a telegram was received from Gen. Carr to Mr. J. C. Biggs, appointing him as proxy. When Mr. Biggs cast his vote in favor of Greensboro, it was the casting vote and received with great enthusiasm. It is needless to say that Mr. Biggs was the hero of the occasion."

## KICKED OVER THE HEART.

**JOHN HESTER BADLY HURT THIS AFTERNOON.**

Carried to His Home and Now Resting Easily—Not Thought to be Serious.

Dr. N. P. Boddie was summoned and attended the wounded man. No bones were broken, but Mr. Hester suffered considerably from pain and the shock. The kick was in an exceedingly dangerous place.

Later on Mr. Hester was carried to the home of his father, where he now is. He is resting as easy as could be expected, and it is thought that no serious consequences need be expected.
