CAPTAIN JOHN.

The Successful Career of a Well Known Georgia Cracker. Down in the sandy hills of Montgomery county, Georgia, just before day Sunday July 22, 1853, a baby boy came into this world, and they named him John. He still bears that name and the reputation of a regular "cracker."

John was a lively kid. His early childhood was spent in catching crickets, grabbing "goobers," and occasional attendance at the public school when no better fun was to be had, and there was a chance to get up a chicken fight or a game of marbles with some of the larger boys.

From 1870 to 1872 he clerked in a country store. This life was too slow for the youngster and in 1873 he went on a maerial train of a narrow gauge lumber road, of which he soon became conductor. He then had a position on the W. & A. road, running between Atlanta and Chattanooga.

From this job he came to North Carolina and ran a train during 1876 from Winston-Salem to Davilite, Va. In 1878 the Georgia cracker was assisting in the construction of the Richmond & Mecklenburg road, now known as the O. & C., branch of the Southern, running from Durham to Keysville. He drove the first spike in this road and when this road was completed to Fort Mitchell in 1881 he ran the first train carrying passengers. For twenty-one years he has been passenger conductor and has never had a collision or wreck in which any one was hurt. He is a man who knows everybody from Durham to Keysville, and one the travelling public of the two States know.

Eighteen years ago he was married to Miss Ida Bishop, of Keysville, Va., where he has a pleasant country home, though at present residing in Durham.

Father Time has dealt gently with his appearance, and his fifty years of life would easily pass for thirty-five. It is almost useless to call his name. All who ever had the pleasure of travelling with him will recognize Conductor John A. Galbraith, of the O. & C.
