THE PROPOSED CAR LINE TO CHAPEL HILL.

It is Believed Would be a Paying Investment and a Most Popular Route.

The chances for the extension of the electric car line to Chapel Hill are said to be very good, and in a few months we hope to be able to inform our readers that work has begun on this line. A gentleman informs us that the line will undoubtedly be built if the Chapel Hill people show the proper encouragement. They are very anxious for the line to connect their town with Durham, and may or may not be called on to vote bonds to secure it. If so, they will be asked to vote a certain amount, and the Traction Company will make up the balance necessary to construct and open the line.

With the Durham baseball park and probably a park located further out between here and Chapel Hill, it would make the line a most popular one.
