HIGH CLASS MUSIC.

The Boston Festival Orchestra a Grand Concert Company.
It is a little remarkable that many people in Durham will talk and talk about good things coming to our city, and when they come they turn out very meagerly.
One of the finest things that has yet sounded a note in Durham's borders was the May Festival Orchestra at Craven Memorial Hall, Trinity Park, on Monday night, and while the audience was large, it was not up to the number that should have greeted this splendid company. Miss Janet Spencer, the contralto, is considered by the ladies as being the prettiest woman that has appeared before a Durham audience, in a professional way, in many years, as well as the finest singer. Glen Hall, the tenor, is a charm. Gwilyn Miles, the baritone, was the wonder of his hearers. The harpist was exceptionally fine. The entire company is grand in their concerts.

Old Papers.

Mrs. E. R. Bryan, of Winston, who is visiting her daughter, Mrs. S. C. Anderson, is the possessor of two very old and valuable relics of the past century. One is an old reprint of the Boston News Letter, published April 24th, 1794—the first newspaper printed in this country. It is filled with quaint items to the reader of this day. The other paper is the N. Y. Gazette, of March 28th, 1726, by William Bradford, whose will was settled after a hundred years litigation, an account of which appeared in the Sun Saturday. These will be valuable additions to any historic society or museum of relics. Mrs. Bryan prizes them very highly.

CHASED HIM TO ROXBORO

DEPUTY PARRISH BRINGS HIS MAN HERE TODAY.

A Negro by the Name of Satterfield Broke Into Carver's Store at Rougemont
John Oscar Satterfield, colored, was brought to Durham today by Deputy Sheriff E. H. Parrish, of Rougemont, and locked up in jail to await the action of the grand jury at next week's term of Durham Superior Court.

From what can be learned, it seems that Satterfield broke into H. L. Carver's store at Rougemont, last Thursday, and stole several things.

Deputy Parrish gave chase and ran his man to Roxboro. The officer went another road in order to head Satterfield off, and waited at a blacksmith shop on the outskirts of Roxboro. When the negro came up he was promptly arrested him. The above is the information that reaches us.

It is said that as soon as the Durham county authorities get through with Satterfield, he will doubtless be carried to Virginia to answer to the charge of breaking into a store at Virgilina. When brought here today he had on a pair of pants that were thought to have been stolen there. When searched he had a lot of cartridges and was munching away on some bananas when carried to jail.
