TRULY WONDERFUL.

Liquid Air Experiments Amazed the Audience.

The large audience present at the Durham Opera House Thursday night enjoyed a rare treat when Prof. S. B. Patty, of Chicago, delivered his lecture on Liquid Air, demonstrating his statements with many startling experiments performed through its agency. From the time the lecture began with an explanation of the historical side of the subject until the present day potency of Liquid Air had been clearly demonstrated, the audience was amazed and spellbound. It is certainly wonderful and intensely interesting.

Numerous experiments and demonstrations were made by Prof. Patty, among them being the following: Freezing of roses and breaking of the petals like brittle glass; freeing of a rubber ball and breaking it into many fragments; the same with a piece of beef steak, a piece of excelsior and a handkerchief. A stew of onions, potatoes and cranberries was frozen; a hammer was made of mercury; alcohol was frozen into an icicle; a tea kettle boiled at a rapid rate on a cake of ice; and the flame of a candle was frozen. Felt, cotton, etc., were consumed almost in a flash; steel pens were heated red hot and fused together, while just below them at the same time berries were frozen hard.

Drs J. M. Manning, N. P. Boddie and J. M. O'Kelly went upon the stage and were shown the uses of Liquid Air in cases of amputation, etc.
