

### THE SUGAR QUESTION.

Witnesses Heard by Committee on Relations With Cuba.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—Emanuel Rionda, raw sugar buyer, was again before the Senate Committee on relations with Cuba today. He said his firm had contracts with many Cuban plantations for their sugar, and had advanced money to planters. If the planters sold to anyone else, the firm would get a commission. The bill passed by the House would wipe out the countervailing duty, he said, and would tend to stop sugar refining in this country. Germany would be the sugar producer of the world, and Cuba, Porto Rico and Hawaiian sugar would be injured.

Howard G. Leavitt, president of the Standard Beet Sugar Company, of Leavitt, Nebraska, said the refiners received all the benefit of the countervailing duty, and would receive all the benefit of concessions to Cuba. He thought the effect of the action of the Brussels conference would be to restore normal conditions in sugar-producing, which would benefit Cuba. England would begin to refine again and make a market for Cuban sugar.

### SAVE A MILLION.

The argument in favor of the Government Building Ships.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—While speaking on the naval appropriation bill today, Mr. W. W. Kitchin asserted that the government would save at least a million dollars in the event the two battleships and two cruisers, authorized by the bill, were erected in the navy yards of the country. He contended that the proposition on the minority to erect a government factory for manufacture of armor plate had resulted in the reduction of armor plate from \$545 a ton to \$420 a ton, plus the royalty, which made a net difference of \$100 a ton to the government.

Collector Duncan and Judge W. S. O'B. Robinson were among today's arrivals. He will see the commissioner of internal revenue tomorrow and will also talk over some political matters with Senator Pritchard.

Mr. Littlefield was unable to accept the invitation.—Special to Raleigh Post.

**Taken Back to Jail.**  
BRISTOL, Tenn., May 14.—Robert Foy, the negro murderer, who broke jail at Wise, Va., allowing a number of other prisoners to escape, was returned to jail at Wise today, having been re-captured in West Virginia.

Foy is under sentence to be hanged July 2nd for the murder of Dayton H. Miller, a prominent young man, who was formerly auditor of the Virginia Iron, Coal & Coke Company, and resided here. Foy narrowly escaped the vengeance of a mob on the day of the murder.

**Will Shott Killed.**  
GRAHAM, Va., May 14.—Mr. Will Shott, general manager of the Great Marello Show, was instantly killed tonight by a freight train on the railroad yard near Bluefield. Mr. Shott was a brother of Hugh L. Shott, editor of the Bluefield Telegraph.

**Fire at Radford.**  
RADFORD, Va., May 14.—During an electrical storm last night the car sheds of the Radford Water Power Company took fire and were seriously damaged, conservative estimates placing the losses at \$4,000.
