 New Bern Won Both on Wednesday.

The victory in both of Wednesday afternoon's games went to New Bern. Durham seemed to have run against a double dose of hard luck. It took ten innings to decide the first game, the score at the end of the ninth standing 3 to 3. New Bern made four in the tenth, causing the score to stand at the close of the game, 7 to 3 in their favor.

The second game resulted as follows: New Bern, 5; Durham, 3. Gettig was taken out of the box at the end of the fifth inning, and Symons substituted for the rest of the game. Durham made her three runs in the fifth inning.

During the progress of the first game, and in the eighth inning, Umpire Dolan was struck by a hot liner batted by Devlin, of New Bern, and was knocked out for a few minutes. The ball struck Pitcher Morris' hand, which in a measure broke the force of the blow, and continuing its journey, hit the umpire in the forehead. Mr. Dolan dropped to the ground as if shot. In a few minutes he recovered sufficiently from the blow and was able to proceed with this game and also to umpire the game which followed. He is all right with the exception of a swollen place where the ball hit him.
