Much excitement prevails, and a lynching will occur if Graves is captured.

WINSTON SALEM, July 10.—Lightning this afternoon set fire to and burned 200 bales of cotton belonging to F. & H. Fries. The house in which the cotton was stored was destroyed. One of the firemen in his efforts to extinguish the flames was painfully injured by a bale of cotton falling on him.
