**Important to Voters—The Voting Places Designated.**  
The precincts and voting places of all the townships, except Durham township, for the Democratic primaries next Saturday, July 26th, shall remain as they were in the last general election, except that the voting place at Cox's Store is changed to Cole's Store, a few hundred yards from Cox's old store.  
The precincts and voting places in Durham township shall be as follows:  
For the voters living in the city of Durham, the precincts and voting places shall be the same as they were in the last city election.  
For the voters living in the two old East Durham precincts, (Commonwealth Mills and Stroud's Store) and now outside of the present city limits, the voting place shall be R. A. Crabtree's drug store on north side of the railroad.  
Bragtown precinct and voting place shall remain as they were in the last general election.  
For the voters living in West Durham precinct, north side (and now outside of the present city limits) the voting place shall be Blacknall's drug store.  
For the voters living in the West Durham precinct, south side (and out side of the present city limits) the voting place shall be B. F. Johnson's store.  
Those voters who formerly voted at the Pearl Mill (and are outside of the present city limits) will vote as follows:  
Those living west of the northern extension of Mangum street will vote at Blacknall's drug store, in West Durham precinct, north side, and those living east of the northern extension of Mangum street will vote at R. A. Crabtree's store, in East Durham precinct.  
Those voters who formerly voted at Owen's store (and are outside the present city limits) will vote at B. F. Johnson's store, in West Durham precinct, south side.

**Magazine Holder.**  
A common wire toaster is sometimes used for a magazine holder. It is first painted with the diamond gold paint; then ribbon is woven through the spaces across the front and to the middle of the back, where the ends of each piece are neatly joined. Blue and white ribbons alternating till the spaces are filled make a pretty contrast with the gold wires. The shorter handle of the toaster is bent down inside the case, and the long one is used to hang it by. As the ribbons are woven in each one is left a little longer as it nears the top of the case, so that the front will hang at the proper angle.

**A Dainty Article.**  
A carnation penwiper, which is easily made, is a dainty article. It consists of a flower and bud of pink cloth and two green cloth leaves attached to a stem, the leaves being larger than the natural foliage of the carnation. The carnation itself is made like the paper ones, a strip of pink cloth being notched and rolled up and a cloth calyx put on. The bud consists of a bit of notched pink cloth rolled up and a calyx attached to that also. A thick green silk wire forms the stems of bud and flower, double green leaves to serve as a penwiper being attached to the wire stem.

**ALL OVER THE HOUSE.**  
A Useful and Pretty Dressing Table That May Be Made at Home.  
The carpenter may be called in to construct for madam an ordinary pine table with good, solid legs and about forty-two inches long and about twenty-nine high, and then all of her taste and ingenuity will count in transforming this same pine table into a thing of usefulness and beauty by just the way she dresses it in its muslin cover. It may be first covered in silk or cambric, and then a dotted or plain muslin valance trimmed with lace or edged in a full frill with narrow beading extends to the floor. Have the valance very full, for it is much better to preserve the fluffy effect. Now make a cover of the same material, lace trimmed and slightly larger than the table. These muslin covers are very easily taken off and washed, so that madam's dressing table is always sweet and dainty.

The prettiest mirror for this table is the round hanging glass which can always be found in all good furniture shops, says the Boston Post. This may be hung or placed on the table and is made doubly dainty by having a scarf of the same muslin as that used for the cover and valance frilled or lace trimmed and thrown over the mirror and caught back at the sides with knots of ribbon the shade of the lining.  
If possible, have the table where a good light comes from the window on the person sitting before it, and also the electric lights should be conveniently placed. Such a table is very inexpensive, very easily made, but very pretty, and when spread with all the bottles, brushes, boxes, pincushion, trays, etc., pleases the most fastidious woman fully as well as if she had spent four times its cost on a black walnut importation or a snowy enamel one in the latest design.

The cheapness of it will not detract from, but, on the contrary, with any sensible woman will enhance, the appreciation of this toilet adjunct to the up to date dressing room.

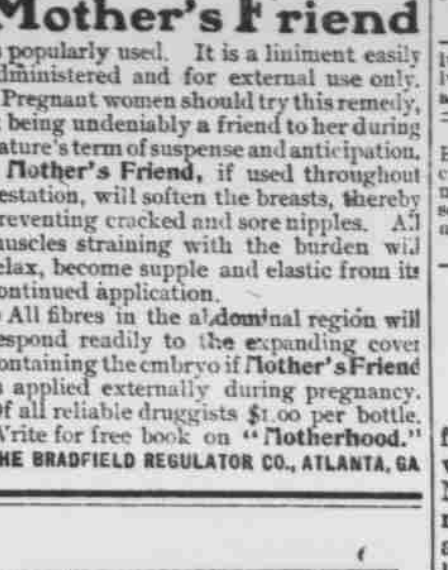
