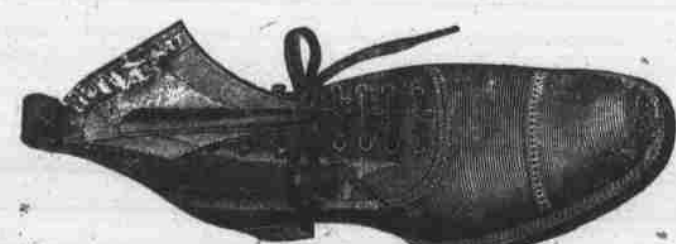

INTERESTING ITEMS FROM OUR NEIGHBORS.

Movements of People and Things in General, Reported Daily By E. F. Abernethy.

The Mount Zion Baptist Association convened this morning at 11 o'clock at the East Durham Baptist church. Quite a number of delegates, ministers and visitors are present.

Three Democratic candidates spoke at East Durham last night. They were Jones Fuller, candidate for the legislature, Hon. A. L. Brooks, candidate for Solicitor, and C. B. Green, candidate for Clerk of the Court. All made excellent speeches.

W. F. McLean and W. C. Perkes, of Raleigh, who have been visiting N. N. McLenis, returned home yesterday.

Miss Nannie Boothe is on the sick list.

James Marshall killed a mad dog yesterday near Commonwealth. It bit one dog belonging to Mr. Boothe and another belonging to Mr. Hackney before it was killed.

STATE NEWS.

The negro arrested at Pocahontas turned out not to be Green McAdoo, the Greensboro wife murder.

Capt. D. E. Savage, chief inspector of the Southern Railway, with headquarters in Greensboro, died Sunday afternoon at Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, where he had gone several days ago for an operation. His remains were carried to Rocky Mount.

The Rad-Pop-independent ticket, nominated at Oxford Saturday, is going to pieces. The nominees for sheriff and treasurer respectively have declined the nomination. The nominee for clerk will also come down. It is evident now that the whole thing is a Pritchard scheme to elect legislators who will vote for him for United States Senator.

An unsuccessful effort was made at 2 o'clock Sunday morning, at Lincolnton, to lynch Calvin Elliott, the negro charged with outraging Mrs. Caleb Brown at her home in Lincoln county, on the night of September 27th. Governor Aycock has ordered a special term of court for Lincoln county, for the purpose of giving Elliott a speedy trial. Court is to convene the 20th of this month, and Judge Francis D. Winston has been commissioned to preside.

Wanted to See the World. Raleigh Times, 6th: Dan Oldham, Charles Pachal and Geo. Flinton three young boys from twelve to fifteen years of age, were arrested in Pullen Park this morning about day-light. A telephone message was received yesterday from Durham asking the police officers to look out for three runaway boys. They left Durham yesterday morning, riding to Cary on the blind baggage, where they detected and made get off. They remained in Cary until an opportunity was given them to ride the bumpers and they came into Raleigh this morning about three o'clock and proceeded at once to Pullen Park, where they could get their first glimpse of the wild west by looking at the bear and wild cat. They had no money to defray their expenses and expected to depend upon their labors for existence. They were returned to Durham by the father of one of them. "We only wanted to see the world," said one of them, "and we will see it yet."
