**GAIN OF 437.**

Some Interesting Figures Regarding the School Census.

The school census of Durham county shows 5,576 children this year against 9,139 last year, a gain of 437. 6,117 are whites and 3,459 colored. The increase during the past year shows 191 whites and 246 colored.

The number of illiterates between the age of 12 and 21 is 665, divided as follows: Whites 373, and colored 292. Last year the number of illiterates was shown to be 364 whites and 394 colored. These figures indicate that the number of illiterate colored children has decreased by 98, and the number of illiterate white children increased by 9.

The increase in the total number of children in the county comes entirely from the city, the increase being 443, while the country districts have a decrease of 6, which brings the gain the past year down to 437.

During the past year the population of the city of Durham has increased rapidly, and many children among the new residents could not read or write. When we stop to consider that Durham draws her population from every direction, it is not to be wondered at that the present conditions prevail.

**Transferred Back Here.**
