## SENATOR J. C. PRITCHARD.

### SPOKE TO A LARGE CROWD THURSDAY NIGHT.

The Speech Was an Earnest One Advocating Republican Doctrines.

Senator Jeter C. Pritchard spoke to a large audience at the court house last night; in fact, the crowd was so large that many were unable to obtain seats.

Dr. E. A. Yates introduced Mr. Pritchard to the audience in a brief manner.

Senator Pritchard said that he esteemed it a great privilege to address such an audience, and thanked Dr. Yates for the kind introduction. He did not purpose in his heart to abuse anybody.

A good deal of Senator Pritchard's speech was devoted to the tariff question. In 1892, under Republican rule, the people of the United States enjoyed a higher degree of prosperity than ever before; more men were employed at remunerative wages than ever before. There never was a President inaugurated under more favorable auspices than Cleveland.

The Wilson-Gorman tariff bill was alluded to, and the speaker contrasted the prices of lumber, wool, rice and mica then with what they are now under the Dingley tariff.

The Kansas City platform was characterized as being the like of which had never been seen before. It declared against every man who had a dollar or could get a dollar. North Carolina has no greater enemy than he who arrays one class against another.

In one of the grandest campaigns ever waged in the United States, the Republicans reelected a President. Under the Dingley tariff, every mica mine is now musical with the hammer, and strap mica is bringing more than it did in block under Democratic rule. Lumber is bringing more and rice one-third more. Every industry is at the high water mark.

During the past year more national banks were established than during the four years of Cleveland's administration. The speaker said he would go further and say that more were established in six months than during the entire Democratic administration. More cotton mills have been built, and more manufacturing establishments. Where one freight train ran under Democratic rule, ten run today; where one passenger train ran then, four run today, and there are ten times more people who ride.

The speaker said that he sympathized with the average Democratic speaker. If he says there is no prosperity in the land, even a mule would laugh at him.

Senator Pritchard alluded briefly to his and Mr. Craig's campaign. He also spoke of Cy Watson, who he said had about as much chance to be elected as a cat did to get out of the lower regions without claws. The people present were advised to vote the Republican ticket; vote against Kitchin, etc.

"Joe Daniels said I was a cancer doctor," said the speaker. "I am not exactly that, but if twelve and a half per cent were involved, would it be wise to cut away the other eighty-seven and a half per cent to get at the cancer?"

Craig was characterized as having the worst case of "negrophobia I ever saw. If he goes on as he has done, he will be in the insane asylum in sixty days."

"They say I am not a friend to the Confederate soldier, because I voted against a certain bill. I did vote against it and would do so again if I had to do so." Senator Pritchard explained why he did so and gave his reason for so doing. He did not know even where the grave was of his father who wore the gray. "Never in my heart could I say anything against the Confederate soldier." Senator Pritchard tried to impress upon his hearers the fact that he was not against pensioning the Confederate soldiers, but was against the particular bill above alluded to.

There were charges of Democratic extravagance, made by the speaker. "We are going to have a deficiency of a million and a half when the Legislature meets."

In concluding his speech, Senator Pritchard thanked the audience for their respectful attention, and complimented them for their intelligence and good looks.
