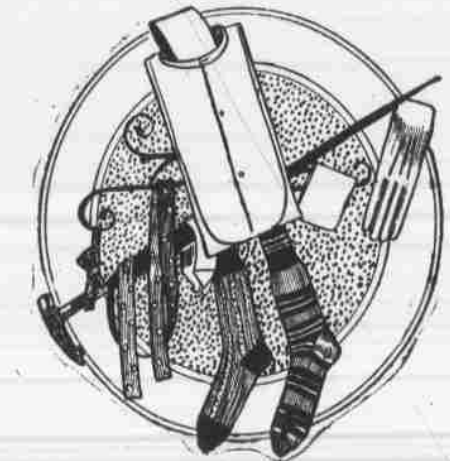

COUPLE WERE HERE TODAY.

THEY APPLIED FOR LICENSE TO MARRY.

Register Suit Refused to Issue the Necessary Papers.

On the early O & C. train this morning, there arrived in Durham Mr. Cary Parham and Miss Critcher, daughter of Mr. W. N. Critcher, of Granville county.

When the O & C. passenger train left here at 9:55 a. m., Mr. Parham boarded the train and left for East Durham, where Miss Critcher had been left. It was expected that the couple would come up on the west bound train en route to Greensboro, where they hoped to obtain license to marry, but the couple were not on board.

Application was made here to Register of Deeds John E. Suitt for a license, but he refused to issue the necessary papers, having been notified by the father of the girl that she was not of age.

It is understood that Mr. Parham told while here that it he failed to secure license at Greensboro that he and Miss Critcher would go to South Carolina.

This is the couple that there was such an exciting chase after in Vance and Granville counties Sunday by the father of the girl. Mr. Critcher drove a horse to death trying to capture them, but they escaped. It is thought that the girl has been in hiding in Granville until they came over here this morning.

BOARD IN SESSION.

Lunsford and Markham Lead the Ticket.

This afternoon the returning board is canvassing the vote of the election in Durham county. They had not completed their work when the Sun went to press.

Enough, however, had been canvassed to determine the vote of the county officers. Treasurer Lunsford's majority over T. J. Holloway was one thousand and seventy-four. Sheriff Markham's majority is one thousand and three; Clerk Green's, five hundred and thirty-two; Register Suitt's, nine hundred and fifty-three; Coroner Maddy's, seven hundred and eighty-eight; Solicitor Brooks, nine hundred and twenty-seven.

The full official returns, as canvassed, will appear in this paper tomorrow.

Wreck on Seaboard.

C. R. Whitaker, of the Durham Marble Works, returned this morning from a business trip to Sanford. He reported that there was a freight wreck on the Seaboard Air Line early this morning at Lemon Springs, six miles beyond Sanford. Two cars jumped the track and smashed up things considerably. No one was hurt. The fast passenger train, north bound, was delayed about two hours on account of the wreck.

The remains of Perry Horton, a worthy colored man, who died at his home on Red Cross street, Wednesday night, between 9 and 10 o'clock, were laid to rest today. Deceased had been in failing health for sometime. He numbered among his friends some of the best white people of this city.

LYON FACTORY SOLD.

Purchased by Aldermen for City Stables.

The City Aldermen made a good move and struck a good bargain when they purchased, on Tuesday last, from Messrs. Watts and Duke the old Z. I. Lyon lot and brick factory, on the corner of east Pettigrew and Pine streets. There is a little over one acre of ground, and a good size brick factory building on it. The purchase price was \$10,000. The building brings in a good rent for a storage house, and this will be continued.

The city stables will be removed to this lot, also the rock-crusher and all machinery pertaining thereto. The present stables on West Main street, will probably be sold, as a very good offer has already been made on that property.
