JOBS THAT PARALYZE

If You Want to Make The Average Man Unfit For Private Initiative Just Place Him on The Public Payroll.

There is something about a public service job that seems to take the pep and independence out of most folks who fall heir to it. They seem to think they can't live unless they are continued on the public pay-roll. Ambition and independence weaken, and the all-consuming thought is to hold the job. More pay will be asked, but the job-holder rarely has the energy to get off and take chances in private business, even with the assurance of more pay in private service.

The foregoing remarks are suggested to the Statesville Landmark by recent events in Raleigh. The consolidation of the automobile agency with the department of revenue seems to have panicked the employees of the automobile bureau. Fear of losing jobs so effected the morale of the automobile workers, a Raleigh correspondent reports, that Secretary of State Everett, their retiring boss, had to herd them together and get Commissioner of Revenue Doughton to assure them that all of them would not be incontinent, if fired. There would be no radical changes, Mr. Doughton assured. He would continue as many of them as possible. That is to say, the employees had to be soothed and assured so that work might go on.

Now the possibility of losing a job, on which one is dependent for a living, is not to be taken lightly. Especially is it understood how it may effect young women who have never known any other job, and who lack confidence in their capacity to secure and retain one. Most of the employees of the State automobile bureau are young women, and there is complete sympathy here for those who are dependent and who took the possible loss of a job seriously. Many of them no doubt have ever held any other job and are doing a class of work that would give them little training for general office work. But with due allowance for all of that, the fact remains that a public service job seems to take the nerve out of the most of them, men as well as women. The idea, which should ever be first with all employees of doing their best, acquiring such efficiency as to be indispensable, seems not to figure at all. Efficiency and industry are always a job-peculiar anywhere. Always there are jobs in plenty waiting for industry and efficiency, for those who try to earn their pay, who see what is to be done, search it out if necessary, and do it without waiting to be told.

By no means, all or even the majority of workers in private employ try to make themselves essential to the business. The rule is to do just enough to save their face, if even that, and they hold on because employers know that others who would come after them would do no better. But in the public service, even in the underpaid jobs, the prospect of loss of position seems to bring utter despair.

WATCH PURCHASED IN 1754 STILL KEEPS GOOD TIME.

Colonel Benehan Cameron, of Stagville, possesses many relics and heirlooms, but one of his most cherished possessions is a watch that was purchased by his great grandfather in Liverpool, England, in 1754. The watch still keeps good time, said Colonel Cameron. It is wound by means of a key and the works are handsomely encased.

"I have been to the very store in Liverpool where this watch was purchased by my grandfather in 1754. The storekeeper showed me the record of sale.

"But that is not the most interesting thing about this watch," continued Colonel Cameron.

"It was carried several hundred yards down the river once when I was in a railroad wreck and the garment in the pocket in which I kept it was found lodged in the limb of a tree but the watch kept on running. It did not even stop.

"That was back in 1890. The wreck occurred near Salisbury. I was also in a Pullman when it happened. The train fell ninety feet through a bridge, while going forty miles an hour. When I waked up I was pinned in beneath an upper berth. The only response I got to the calls for help I uttered was the hissing of the engine. I knew something had to be done right away. I was in water up to my neck, I finally managed to get hold of the chains that held the upper berth in place and released them. Then I extricated myself.

"This watch was found later far

down the river where it had been taken by the current when the train fell into the water. I shall never forget that experience."

Colonel Cameron's watch has the maker's name and the number in it. The number is small, indicating its antiquity. The company that made it is still doing business, Colonel Cameron said. It has put out millions of watches since his was purchased in 1754 by his great grandfather.
