

CITY SCHOOLS WILL OPEN FOR WORK WEDNESDAY MORNING

First Faculty Meeting Will Be Held at 10 O'Clock Tuesday Morning—On the First Day Pupils Will Be Graded, Schedules Organized and Books Distributed—Friends and Patrons Asked to Visit School.

The teachers of the Sanford schools are expected to be in the city Monday evening, September 1, to begin preparation for the opening of school.

On Wednesday morning, September 3rd, school will open at the usual hour 8:30 o'clock.

On Thursday there will be a short schedule of work and assignments and the pupils dismissed; the first grade at 11 o'clock, and other grades at 1 o'clock.

On Friday a little longer period will be run until the noon hour; short periods in the afternoon until 2:30, at which time all grades will be dismissed.

There will be no chapel or assembly meetings on Wednesday or Thursday.

On Monday morning we expect to begin the full schedule with hours as heretofore.
