"The last quarter opens without significent sign of autumn acceleration of promosing prospect of early imprevement in the business picture in any other essential respect. Fortunately the Federal Re-serve is freely offering its blood transfusions of reserve credit to main transitisions of reserve credit to main tain easy money conditions in this market in face of emergency foreign and domestic demands.
