churches for a number of years. Rev. Jas. McQueen died while pastor of St. Andrews and is now taking his last long sleep in the church cemetery. The congregation showed their appreciation of services rendered by Mr. McQueen as pastor by presenting him with a tract of land near the church. This land is still owned by the McQueen heirs and the dwelling in which a fine family of children were born and reared still stands. Like many other families in that section the children have grown to manhood and womanhood and are now living in other states. Mrs. Albert Bledsoe, of Decatur, Ala., who, before her marriage was Miss Nettie McQueen, recently visited the old home place and the church of her childhood for the first time in 30 years. Other members of the family occasionally pay a visit to the old home and church in which they received their early Christian training.

The cemetery was started about the time the church was built. Many of the markers in this cemetery bear old Scotch names. The dates on some of these markers show that the people who are buried there were among the early Scotch settlers. Mr. J. J. Edwards, who is well informed on local history, informs The Express that a brother of Col. Alfred M. Waddell, was buried in the St. Andrews cemetery. He moved from this section to Mississippi years ago and became a wealthy planter. In his old age he de-

ceded to return to his native State, and was taken sick and died on the way. His remains were brought to St. Andrews for interment. In his day and time Col. Alfred M. Waddell, who moved from this section to Wilmington, became prominent in politics and represented the Third Congressional district in Congress. A third brother was a prominent lawyer.
