Local Kiwanians Have 'Library Night' Friday

The Kiwanis Club in its meeting at the Carolina Hotel made last Friday night "Library Night." All were interested in the history of the Sanford Library, now the County Library, as given by James McIver. He told of the struggles the Sanford Library Club experienced in keeping it alive after it had been organized. From time to time they moved it from house to house and kept it alive despite the fact that they often had very little money to support it. For years the men of the town turned a deaf ear to the appeals of the women to make the necessary contributions to keep it from closing its doors. Its history, which was published in this paper in 1929, reads almost like a novel. The women raised some money for its support by giving entertainments from time to time.

It now seems that the library stands a good chance of becoming a permanent institution and will "grow up" with the town and county. It has become a county institution and is supported by the county. C. H. Crabtree, a member of the board of county commissioners, made a talk covering the progress the library has made since the commissioners voted to appropriate \$1,000 to its support and make it a county library. A large number of people from the surrounding section have visited the library during the past few weeks and called for books to read.

Women Start On Their Campaign for the NRA

Some 40 women from Sanford and Jonesboro, held a meeting in the ball room of the White Hotel Tuesday morning and received pledge cards and instructions for the house-to-house canvass to collect the support of every household in the NRA campaign.

Mrs. Charles L. Scott, chairman of Lee county women's division, presided and explained the plan to the workers. She said that it is desired that every woman be given an opportunity of signing the card pledging support to the business houses flying the Blue Eagle, but urged that no "hallyhoo" methods be used. "Should any household decline to sign, take her name and leave quietly as no coercion would be used," said Mrs. Scott.

A. K. Miller, general chairman for Lee county, spoke briefly on the NRA plan and of the cooperation which it is receiving throughout the nation. He declared that Sanford merchants were already feeling the good effects of increased pay rolls of local manufacturing plants who have adopted the plan.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Mrs. Scott went to the colored section of the city, where she met with a number of representative colored women and organized teams for making a canvass there.

In the Superior court at Hillsboro last Monday, Judge W. A. Devin presiding, the case of W. C. Womble and others vs. Miss Alice Ingram was disposed of, the plaintiff being awarded \$11,000.00 by consent judgment. They had been awarded \$14,000.00 at a former term of court. The suit grew out of an automobile accident in which Miss Stella Womble lost her life and a child in the Womble car was injured for life. The accident occurred near Chapel Hill.
