As we grow older and decrease our exercise, we naturally tend to accumulate fat, mon Springs, and 28 grandchildren,

In the last 40 years, the average length of life for Americans has jumped from 45 to 60 years. All this gain, however, has come among the young people. Medicine has won its notable victories against the diseases of those under 35.

Among the older people we seem to be backsliding. The answer, according to the American Magazine's survey, is to be found in our eating habits. The disease of which older people die are mostly those which appear earliest in overweight persons. The vital organs are unable to carry the burden of excess weight. Among the results are high blood pressure, hardening of arteries, increase in size of the heart, and kidney disturbances.

And how, if one is overweight, can he get down to the right level? The most important thing is to remember that weight reduction is not a trick. If it is to be permanent benefit, dieting must be a lifetime job. Many fat people, in a burst of enthusiasm, will diet off 10 pounds in a few weeks. But only a few will adopt a correct diet and stick to it.
