### URGED TO BACK TAX

Approximately 500 Lee county farmers in mass meeting here unanimously adopted a resolution offered by K. E. Seymour, asking Senators Josiah W. Bailey and Robert R. Reynolds, and Congressman Walter Lambeth to vote for and to use their influence for the continuation of the cotton processing tax as now set up.

The meeting was called by county agent E. O. McMahan for the purpose of explaining to the tobacco and cotton growers the new rulings involving the 1935 contracts.

It is planned by the First Baptist church to construct two buildings on the lot in rear of the church facing on Steele street. One will be used as a parsonage by the pastor of the church and the other one will be for rent. At a meeting of the board of leasons Monday night the following building committee was appointed to have charge of the construction of buildings: Charles P. Rogers, W. A. Crabtree and Jarvis Brooks. Mr. W. R. Hartness will have charge of the construction work. The building that is on the lot will be removed and much of the material will be used in the new buildings. The movement for the construction of these buildings received the sanction of the church last Sunday.

We are informed that Eugene Makepeaces are planning to build an apartment house on a lot on Steele St. this side of the Episcopal church. The house that is on the lot will be removed. It is expected that the building will be removed and that work will begin on the structure at an early date. We are informed that there is now not a vacant dwelling house in Sanford. Two years ago there could be found on about every street in the town many empty houses. Houses are now in demand.

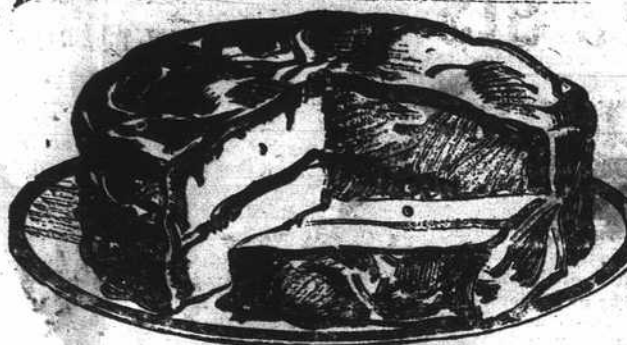
