Bro. Justice regrets that so little had been told in the letters on the subject of Sunday Schools. Strangers would be misinformed. We are not doing enough for this work. I visit this body to encourage the churches to study the work of God. Our motto is a Sunday School in every Baptist Church and in every suitable neighborhood.

I wish to foster all the Sunday School interests. Every Christian is called to preach the gospel, and we can preach in a thousand ways. On every Sabbath, Christians should spend part of the day, in teaching the gospel. If any oppose these efforts I tell them, your Savior said, "Suffer little children to come unto me."

The Sunday School Board of our Convention has been abolished.—The work has been assigned to the Sunday School Association. That body I have the honor to represent, and our work is very encouraging; I do not think any church can enjoy spiritual life without a Sunday school and prayer meeting. Going once a month to hear a sermon is not the whole duty of a Christian, in many places the Sunday school interest is revived. Where there were recently 150 Sunday School children, now there are nearly 2000. Many churches have several Sunday schools. Many feel a desire to give personal labor for the cause. The Sunday school affords the field.—We desire, not a feverish excitement, but permanent labor. The prophet put salt in the spring and the waters were sweet. So we must begin with the children.

Our children are dear to our hearts. We can work for their good.

Send to me for any Sunday school books of every kind. In behalf of all the children I ask you to engage in this work.

CHRIST IS ALL.

In our return to God we are accepted in Christ and cleansed from the pollution of sin. The law of grace frees us from the law of sin and Jesus has the glory of salvation.
