The paper is also, of course, valuable to the bar crowd, and I do appreciate the support of your advertisers. Also well served are those many gay people living in rural locations and small towns.

For all your altruistic services, I thank you folks very sincerely. I would enjoy reading an occasional update on the state of the health and economy of your paper. I read with interest your statement of purpose before you ceased publication—though your troubles saddened me. I was happy when you resumed publication, and from the looks of your ad displays, it would appear that a lot of good organizational leg-work is being done by some unsung hereos.

I hope that the gay women of North Carolina will become involved in the work of The Front Page. Surely your paper could provide a good forum for worthy lesbian causes. I like to think of myself as a strong feminist, and certainly all women, gay and straight, have a lot in common with gay men: centuries of oppression by a male-dominated, homophobic society.

There are millions of people in this country who prefer to live in a gloriously pluralistic

society, with the great richness that comes from the combination of people of many colors, creeds, national origins, beliefs, and sexual preferences. To each, her/his own. Live and let live. 
