Coble Calls Gay Lifestyle Abhorrent

LEXINGTON—According to an article which appeared in the Lexington *Dispatch*, oil filters, animal shelters, foreign policy and homosexuals were some of the hot topics at a town meeting held by Sixth District Republican U.S. Rep. Howard Coble, on August 5 in the Davidson

County Courthouse.

Coble, jotting notes on a paper tablet, started the 90-minute meeting by allowing each of the 24 constituents to ask questions and to make comments. After everyone had finished, he responded to each person.

One of the last constituents to speak was James Dennis of Davidson County. He expressed his dissatisfaction with the current state of government and American society.

"Do you know the time when government is going to change their minds?" Dennis asked Coble. "The people here aren't stupid. He [President Clinton] might trick them in Arkansas but we're not stupid."

Dennis went on to ask if Coble knew anything about United Nations or Russian soldiers being in the United States. Coble said that some probably were for training purposes, but he also did not seem to think their presence posed much of a threat.

Dennis said he could see the time when the United States would fall. He argued that stricter gun control laws and homosexuals' influence would ruin the country.

"I'll raise my children. Don't let...the homosexuals in the community...teach them anything," Dennis said. "And nobody's coming in like Waco and getting my guns."
