Urges Local And National LGBT Organizations To Stand United Against War

Al-Fatiha Foundation, a USbased organization dedicated to Muslims who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT), joined a diverse coalition of LGBT groups that oppose a pending war against Iraq, the Bush administration's current "war on terrorism," and its continued infringement of domestic civil rights and liberties.

At a meeting held in Portland, OR, on November 8th, at the Creating Change conference, a coalition of LGBT local and national organizations came together to strategize around a united response to the Bush administra-

domestic and international "war."

Al-Fatiha a 1 s o announced its formal position against any potential war against Iraq, or any other country in the

world, under the guise of a "war on terrorism."

Al-Fatiha urged other local and national LGBT organizations to stand united and to join local and

national coalitions opposed to war.
"We must stand together in the face of great aggression," said Faisal Alam, in reference to the Bush administrations continued infringement of domestic civil liberties, and the unilateral push for international war.

"The LGBT movement must ally itself with the larger progressive and peace-loving movement, if we are to utlimately win our freedom and liberation," he continued.

Al-Fatiha endorsed the October 26th anti-war and peace march on Washington, DC sponsored by International ANSWER, and also plans on endorsing and participate in the upcoming peace march and Grassroots Peace Congress, to be held in Washington, DC and San Francisco during the Martin Luther King Jr. weekend holiday (January 18-19, 2003).
