Less famous in politics than his two illustrious brothers, the congressman and former lieutenant-governor, W. F. Doughton, of Laurel Springs, is a veteran farmer of no small repute, and should it become necessary, the chances are that he could tell "Farmer Bob" and "Governor Rufe" many things about cattleraising.

Son of one of the county's most distinguished citizens, the late J. H. Doughton, he was born at Laurel Springs on January 28, 1870. He first attended school in his native community, with later intervals at Bellview and at Sparta under the tutelage of the late Professor S. W. Brown.
