

Draftees, seeking release because of the age limitations, must get release papers from the commanding officer of the post where they are stationed.

To provide a classification for men who are released from the provisions of the selective service act by reason of age, a new class, called "1-H" has been created for men who have reached their 28th birthday on or before July 1 without having been inducted into the army.
