It's not easy to become a chief petty officer in the Navy and these are the first four WAVES who qualified for the rating. Women must take examinations and be considered for advancement along with other enlisted Navy personnel. Chiefs wear the same uniform as other enlisted WAVES, except for an officer's type hat with the toulad anchor — the regular chief petty officer's cap device. Rhodell Angel comes from Thief River Falls, Minn. Vera Maxine Pearson's home is in Loda, Ill. Frances D. Hanusik is from Yonkers, N. Y. Marion T. Longhurst is a native of Stamford, Conn. Three of the chiefs are stationed in Washington and Chief Longhurst is on duty in New Orleans, La. The Navy can't promise many girls will qualify for chief, but it offers good-paying, patriotic jobs to qualified women between 20 and 36, without children under 18.
