JAPAN GIVES UP

Plans Made For Improvements In Schools At Meet

To Conduct Work Shops And Study Courses; Group Re- ceives Suggestions

Ways and means of improving instruction through study courses and workshops in the schools of the county, were discussed and plans were made at the county-wide teacher's meeting held here on Tuesday.

Miss Clyde Fields, superintendent of schools, was in charge of the meeting at which Mrs. Hattie Parrot, a member of the Division of Instructional service of the State Board of Education, and Mrs. Ruth Moore, assistant advisor of physical education and health of the State Board of Education, spoke to the group.

Miss Fields pointed out that all teachers of Alleghany would be expected to carry on workshops and study courses during this school year. Many helpful suggestions were given by Mrs. Parrot and Mrs. Moore.

Principals of all schools were given instructional and janitorial supplies at the meeting.

About fifty percent of the teachers of the county were present for the meeting.

County To Get Share Of Roads

Raymond Smith Addresses Chamber Of Commerce Group Friday Night

The people of Alleghany were assured that this county would be granted a full share of all road building and improvements in the near future, in an address by Raymond Smith, member of the State Highway Commission for this district, to the chamber of commerce here last Friday night.

Mr. Smith further stated that just as soon as equipment and materials were available, work would be started on roads throughout the state, in which Alleghany county is to share equally with other counties.

"We are going to act rather than talk," Mr. Smith said, as he discussed fully the roads and finances of the state.

Mr. Ashby, district supervisor of the State Highway Department, was also a guest at the meeting.

Forty members and guests were present at the community building, where the Woman's Club served a buffet dinner.

To Register For Canning Sugar

All those who have not registered for canning sugar this year, may do so from August 20 through August 31 Mrs. Robert Fleetwood, clerk of the Alleghany county ration board, announced this week.

Mrs. Fleetwood pointed out that registrants must be permanent residents of the county in order to get their allotment from this board.

It was also pointed out that those persons who had already received their allotments should not apply again, because no additional sugar would be issued, since this registration is only for those who did not apply earlier.
