WORLD SPEED WINNER Sparta Man Given Important Assignment; May Deal With Tojo

> U. S. District Attorney Carlisle Higgins, of Sparta, in all probability will prosecute Japanese General Hideki Tojo, who, as Premier, directed the Pearl Harbor attack on Dec. 7, 1941, Joseph B. Keenan, chief prosecutor of Jap war criminals under General MacArthur and former assistant attorney general announced, following Higgins' appointment as chief assistant to Keenan.

Keenan was head of the Department of Justice criminal division in the early days of the Roosevelt Administration when Higgins first became District Attorney after having been Superior Court Solicitor.
