Some Schools Are Deleted And Others Get Increases, Based On Attendance



\$2.00 a Year Out of County Special School Tax Planned By Commissioners

Needed To Build Sparta Graded School; Would Pay For Building Soon

R. Floyd Crouse, attorney for he board of county commissioners, announced this week that a special tax levy for the purpose of raising funds to erect a necessary graded school building for

sparta is now being considered.
Attorney Crouse explained that he amount of the levy would be nnounced later. This will be determined by the amount of money deemed necessary to erect the building, he said. According to the present plans the building will be designed so that it can be erected in sections, with

hore added on from time to time. Mr. Crouse pointed out that in tentative survey of opinion on the matter, that most people agreed that it would be more satisfactory in the long run to make the levy sufficient to pay for the proposed building within two years. "If we build it while the price of cattle is fifteen cents, we do not want to find it necessary to pay it back when the price of cattle drops to five cents," one man aptly said. "If we build it rhean money we should certainly pay for it on cheap money," another declared. Another man pointed out, "Buildings erected while money is plentical, should be paid for out of this same kind of money instead of waiting until it is scarce and very hard to get."
