Schools Open With Record Enrollment

Alleghany Gets Extra Allotment Of Scarce Sugar

Sugar Is Granted By OPA Through Influence Of Congressman Doughton

Some relief for the acute sugar shortage in Alleghany county was seen this week with the announcement by a wholesale grocery firm that a carload of sugar would be available for this section this week end or the first of next week.

Through the influence of Congressman R. L. Doughton, it was learned here vesterday, an extra allotment of sugar has been made by the OPA for this section. The sugar is being handled by a wholesale grocery firm and will be shipped by rail to Elkin where it will be distributed.

All retail merchants in Alleghany county who wish to get sugar are asked to send their name and address, along with the total of the amount of stamps they have for the purchase to Thomas and Howard Company, care General Delivery, Elkin, N. C., and they will be notified when to get the sugar, it was explained

The merchants will pick up the sugar direct from the Elkin depot, it was pointed out. Customers must purchase the sugar from the retail grocers as usual, it was announced.

Housewives throughout the county, who have been having much difficulty in securing sugar for canning and other household needs, will welcome the extra allotment, merchants declared.
