West Jefferson — (Special) — Plans are again being worked out for the annual feed calf sale to be held here early next month, H. D. Quessenberry announced yesterday. The definite date as well as

other details will be announced next week, Mr. Quessenberry said. Farmers are again reminded that this is for good grade fat calves and that scrub calves are not to be handled at this time.

In order to get fat calves ready for the sale they should be vaccinated and de-horned if possible. This is not necessary, however, he declared. The sale is being sponsored again because a number have asked for it, it was explained. Officials of the N. C. 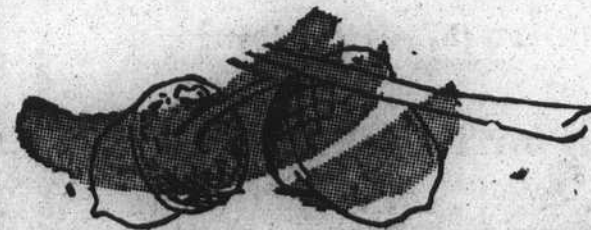
