In the race for state representative, C. W. Erwin, whose name is not on the official ballot but who is the Democratic candidate, is opposed by Walter Johnson, Republican.

Gene R. Irwin, Democrat, in unopposed for clerk of the Superior court and Lee M. Woodruff, Democrat, has no opposition for the office of coroner. In the sheriff's race. Glenn D. Richardson, Democrat, is opposed by Roy L. Brooks, Republican. Dillon M. Edwards, Democrat, and Robert Hoppers. Republican, are in the race for county commissioner. 
