Incomplete returns from Tuesay's election gave Congressman L. Doughton a big majority ver his Republican opponent, lyde R. Greene. Unofficial reurns from Ashe county give him majority of around 300. Allehany poled over more than 885 najority.

The Congressman also took big eads in Iredel, Cabarrus, Rowan, Caldwell, and Alexander, with tanley and Watauga as the only ounties in the district in the Republican fold, according to unfficial returns. Unofficial estinates placed the Congressman's ajority in the district at more han 8,000.


