Alleghany County Library Now Has Several New Books

Alleghany County Library has received, since the first of July, 230 new books for adults and children. Some of the latest books are reviewed below.

Last Chapter—by Ernie Pyle. This is the final book of Ernie's war reporting. In this book he goes to the Pacific war zone, and experiences a side of war new to him. Ernie Pyle was America's greatest and best-loved correspondent and his writings will stand as one of the war's most vital records.

The War in Maps—by Francis Brown. An atlas of New York Times maps designed to illustrate a particular phrase of a military operation or situation.

A Lion Is In The Streets—by Adria L. Langley. This is the story of a man, potentially a great leader, tricked and destroyed by his love of power; and of a woman, loyal and honorable, forced to choose between her love and her deepest convictions.

The Bulwark — by Theodore Dreiser. Solon, a devout Quaker, hovering on the brink of complete spiritual disillusionment, undergoes an intense religious experience, and out of it comes the knowledge that his life's tragedies are small beside God's mercy and that the secret of life is love.

Lady in the Tower—by Katherine Burt. Jenny found romance—enough to last her a lifetime—in a bewildering strange and passionate

affair in which her very life is involved, before she solved the mystery that held her in its thrall.

Ruth Middleton—by Louis Zara. From Ruth Middleton's first gasp of life to her first emotional kiss, not artifice but life races through these pages. It is a book filled with those songs of living to which most of us are deaf.

A Treasury of Doctor Stories—by Fabricant. This is a collection of stories about doctors, nurses, and patients by some of the world's leading writers.

Golden Earrings—by Yolanda Folds. Here is a gay love story, delightful and just a little wicked, about a Colonel and a Gipsy.

The Shocking Pink Hat—by Frances Crane. Frances Crane is rapidly becoming one of the best-selling mystery writers in this country, and this is one of her best stories.

American Legend—by Van Gelder. These are the stories that catch, that hold fast for all time, the ideals that animated our people only yesterday, the trials, and tragedies and triumphs they have known.

The library has a great many more interesting books, besides a large number of new books for children.
