Raleigh — (Special) — Bills to create the State Wildlife Resources commission and to outlaw manufacture, sale and use of fireworks passed final legislative readings Tuesday, while dry forces presented arguments before a committee for a statewide liquor referendum.

As the deadline for filing income tax returns, March 15 draws near Washington experts point out that there are three kinds of individual income tax returns for 1946 income. They are:

2. The short return on form 1040.
